

Gardening or any gardening-related projects were furthest from my mind when I grew up and entered my professional career, yet once I moved to Cheshire in 1984 it took off like the Energizer Bunny and is still going and going and going.

You see, as a teenager I was very much involved in Gymnastics and Field and Track intercollegiate competitions while studying the Sciences at one of the Academies in Hamburg. Then when I moved to New York and subsequently to New Haven, I became deeply involved with several choral societies, performing classical masterpieces at such venues as Carnegie Hall, the Met, and Yale's Woolsey Hall in New Haven.

My degrees in Biology and Psychology and School Counseling served me handsomely as Postgraduate Education Director and Genetics Associate at Yale and later at UCONN. Over a twelve-year span I conducted over sixty week-long courses in Ultrasound for physicians from all over the world — I loved meeting them all from so

many foreign lands; I co-authored many research articles and translated numerous documents from German into English.

Having studied Latin and Greek helped tremendously with understanding all that medical terminology. The highlight during this time was a half-hour program PBS did on my involvement with counseling patients. One novelist even wrote an entire chapter about yours truly around that time.

After my retirement I joined the Cheshire Garden Club and soon became whole-heartedly involved with conducting the garden Beauty Spots of the Month program from April through October, selecting the most attractive front yard in town each month. To see the surprise on the winner's faces was priceless. After having interviewed the winner, I took a picture and then wrote up the article for publication in the local Cheshire Herald. Not only did I realize how much I enjoyed photography but also how learned I had become with landscaping principles and horticulture terminology.

Around that time I also began developing my half-acre property into a 63-flower bed ornamental garden, all the while delving into dozens of horticulture and gardening books to get myself into the know. I ended up designing and creating several gardens in town on behalf of the Cheshire Garden Club. Imagine!

The Federated Garden Clubs of Connecticut, Inc. heard about my involvement with the Beauty Spot of the Month program and asked me to speak to them at one of their meetings. Before long I was asked to join The Federation Board – that was 22 years ago. Sooner or later several clubs invited me to speak to them with a view toward establishing their own program in town, which I gladly did.

I eventually chaired several committees on the Board, such as Program, Nominating, Website, and for twelve years as Parliamentarian. I've been an active member of the Awards Committee as well as the Finance Committee.

Now in its 88th year, our Federation has installed me as their 44th President.

My theme picks up on the NGC theme of "PLANT AMERICA." With "PLANT CONNECTICUT – BE A CONSERVATION CHAMPION" our members are encouraged to support a healthy environment for today and for future generations by conserving water, assisting pollination and garden naturally. They may participate in two contests to either create a pollinator-friendly garden or a Xeriscape

garden in a public space and might just be awarded handsomely with the Conservation Champion Award come April 2019. Individual garden club members may also participate by creating a Xeriscape garden on their own property – also in the running for the coveted Conservation Champion Award.

In conclusion, my life has taken me to two continents and six large metropolitan cities. I have been involved with four major areas of interest, which have become passions of immense importance to me at the time. However, most important of all, it has provided me the opportunity to meet with people from every corner of the world.

Even now that I am Connecticut's president, having gotten to know a lot of the folks in our 124 garden clubs over the last 22 years, I will strive to engage them with a strong conviction both with a view toward raising awareness to protect our environment as well as to stimulate communication – both ways - through their continued association with our Federation I am so proud of.
