A. NGC Board of Directors - Each member of the Board of Directors shall be entitled to one vote by virtue of their position.






After registering at the convention, all those with voting rights will need to go to the credentials table to sign in and be given voting cards.

An Old Idea Finds New Life?

How many have been around long enough to remember Procedure Books? Maybe they were in school theme folders. Maybe they were filled with elderly information and stale examples of letters. Has your state discarded that old-school idea? But Procedure Books can find new life these days as new people join our organization. Knowing what it was like ITOD (In The Old Days) might aid in understanding the reason for the particular chairmanship and analyzing the position and suggesting new methods, new technologies that could help move your "train" down the track. Procedure Books can be digital and so shared with prospective board members to entice new people to join our leadership ranks. Procedure Books can be helpful for historical reasons so the old-fashioned hard copy is not all bad. Appoint a team to review every Procedure Book for relevancy and bring it up to date. If Procedure Books don't exist, then ask each member of your team to write their own. Start with a month by month list of activities. Some chairmanships may not have something to do every month but it's a place to start! Then, when the First VP tries to bring someone on board, they can point the new person to a Procedure Book. People are much more likely to agree to serve if they know EXACTLY what they are getting themselves into!

GROW NATIVE!

Trees alter the environment in which we live by moderating the effects of climate, air pollution, water conservation and by providing wildlife habitat.

What to plant. Select species adapted for growth under local climate and soil conditions. Other considerations are a tree's mature height and shape (proper scale to fit the site and surrounding structures), root spread (small street spaces, cracked sidewalks, paved areas, building foundation, walls) longevity, rate of growth, site requirements: sun or shade and wet or dry site. Species attributes: flowers, fruits (nuts or large fruit in pedestrian areas), seasonal colors, and the susceptibility to disease, insects or to storm damage. Select healthiest specimen with the best form.

Where to plant. The site you select will determine your choice of tree, i.e., winter windbreak, summer cooling, sight or sound barrier. Do not plant trees under overhead wires or above underground utilities. Tree branches should be high enough for pedestrians to walk beneath.

<u>How to plant.</u> If at all possible prepare the planting site, a hole 3 times the diameter of the root ball, before you bring in the tree. Cut away and remove wire baskets, strings, burlap, plastic and container. Plant, by lifting the well-watered root ball into the planting space. Balance the tree upright on the firm center of the space. Fill to trunk flare and top of root ball at surrounding grade level. Mulch lightly, leaving a bare 3" circle around the trunk. Regularly, deep water throughout the first growing season. Avoid injuring the trunk. Stake if necessary.

Patty's Parliamentary Procedure Helps



What's the difference between tabling a motion, referring a motion, and postponing a motion?

As NGC Parliamentarian, I've been asked to address this question as part of an NGC Leadership Workshop on March 14th. I will share this information, as well, in this issue of *Keeping In Touch*. The three motions above are all subsidiary motions, meaning they are used by the assembly to treat, or dispose, of, a main motion. Notations after each motion below references where more detailed information can be found in Robert's Rules of Order (RONR) Newly Revised 12th Edition. As always, please feel free to contact me with any questions you might have for me. I am happy to serve the members of NGC!

Lay on the Table—this motion is used when there is a reason for the assembly to lay the motion aside temporarily, without setting a time for resuming its consideration, but, with the provision that the motion can be taken up again (to Take From the Table) whenever the majority so decides to do so. (RONR 12th ed. 17:1-24)

To Refer (or Commit) - this motion is used when a main motion needs to be amended, but it may take too much time to amend motion properly, or that additional information may be needed. By moving to "refer" the motion, it is turned over to a committee for study or redrafting before the assembly considers it further. It is generally used to send a pending question to a relatively small group of selected persons—a committee—so that the question may be carefully investigated and put into better condition for the assembly to consider. (RONR 12th ed. 13:1-26)

To Postpone (or to Postpone to a Certain Time or to Postpone Definitely) - this is a motion by which action on a pending question can be put off, within limits, to a definite session, day, meeting, or hour, or until after a certain event. Do not use the language "to defer" when making the motion to postpone. A question may be postponed either so that it may be considered at a more convenient time, or because debate has shown reasons for holding off on a decision until a later time. Do NOT confuse with the motion to Postpone Indefinitely, as this will not postpone a motion, but will actually kill it. (RONR 12th ed. 14:1-22)
