3 GENERAL RULES

- This is a National Garden Clubs (NGC) Design Specialty Flower Show and conforms to the standards established by NGC according to the Handbook for Flower Shows 2017 edition. <u>https://gardenclub.org/sites/default/files/2022-01/ngc-handbook-for-flower-shows-january-2022-revision.pdf</u>
- 2. All classes are open to all NGC members.
- 3. Design and Botanical Arts Design Entries will be accepted on Tues April 2 3-5pm (traveling long distance, must contact Judy Gray, judy.gray123@gmail.com) and Wednesday April 3, 7AM-9AM.
- 4. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per class but may enter more than one class.
- 5. If a designer is unable to fulfill her/his assignment, it is her/his responsibility to find a replacement and notify the Design Entries Chair.
- 6. Youth Entries will be accepted on Tuesday, April 2, 9AM-2:30 PM.
- 7. Educational Entries will be accepted on Tuesday, April 2, Noon-5:00PM.
- 8. Judging will take place Wednesday April 3, 2024, 10:00AM
- Exhibits must be removed on Sunday, April 7, after the show closes, between 5:00 pm and 6:00 pm. No early removal. If you are unable to pick up make arrangements with someone for pickup.
- 10. The Classification Chair for each division checks the exhibits for conformity to the schedule prior to the judging. Final determination for conformance is the judges' responsibility.
- 11. The General Chair and the Classification Chair are available during the judging for possible consultation. They, along with the Judges and Clerks, are the only personnel allowed on the floor during the judging.
- 12. The decisions of the judges are final. Awards may be withheld if not merited.
- 13. There must be an emphasis on *fresh* plant material. No artificial plant material is permitted in any division.
- 14. Refer to HB P80 for items permitted without schedule approval.

- 15. The RIFGC and the RI Builder's Association will strive to assure the safety of all items after arrival and placement but are not responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.
- 16. Conservation/Endangered list may not be used unless grown by the exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner and so stated. Invasive plants may never be used.
- 17. Entering a design gives the flower show permission to use the design in photos, promotions, etc.
- 18. All Classes refer to Scales of Points on page 17 in the schedule.

4 AWARDS

THE STANDARD SYSTEM OF AWARDING IS USED

Only one first place (blue) ribbon per class. Must score 90 points or more. Only one second place (red) ribbon per class. Must score 85 points or more. Only one third place (yellow) ribbon per class. Must score 80 points or more. One or more honorable mention (white) ribbons per class. Must score 75 points or more.

Judges are asked to consider non-blue-ribbon winners for a 90+ recognition.

NGC TOP EXHIBITOR AWARDS

All Top Exhibitor Awards must be blue-ribbon winners scoring 95 or above

Design Division

<u>Award of Design Excellence</u> - A Division Award: Only one award may be offered to the highest scoring blue-ribbon exhibit in the entire Design Division. This award is a rosette of gold ribbons.

Section Awards

Must have a minimum of three classes with four entries in each section.

Designer's Choice Award: Exhibitor has the freedom to select components, within the NGC policies. Section D is eligible for this award, a rosette of purple ribbons.

<u>Petite Award:</u> May be offered to the most outstanding Petite Design. Section B is eligible for this award, a small rosette of blue and white ribbons.

<u>Table Artistry Award</u>: This award is available for Functional and Exhibition tables. Section C is eligible for this award, a rosette of burgundy ribbons.

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Tricolor Award: This award requires that all plant material used in the designs must be **fresh**. Section A is eligible for this award, a rosette of red yellow and blue ribbons.

Botanical Arts Design Division

Botanical Arts Design Award: Must consist of at least three (3) classes with at least four (4) exhibits in each class. Section A is eligible for this award, a rosette of yellow and orange ribbons.

Education Division

Educational Top Exhibitor Award: Must have a minimum of two (2) exhibits. Must use a minimum of 18 square feet of surface space. This award is a rosette of brown and white ribbons.

Youth Division

<u>Youth Top Exhibitor Awards - Artistic Crafts & Design</u>: An Award may be given to the best exhibit in each of the three age groups. Junior: Pre-school – 7 yrs, Intermediate: 8yrs – 12yrs, and High School: 13yrs – 18yrs. The exhibit must score 90 or more points. These awards are a rosette of red, white, and blue ribbons.

ADDITIONAL AWARDS

Rhode Island Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. Awards:

Rhode Island Federation of Garden Clubs' President's Award: This award winner is selected by the President of RIFGC from among the blue-ribbon winners in the Division I Design. This award is a rosette of green and white ribbons.

Flower Show Judges' Award: This award may be given to the exhibit in the Design Division that best depicts its class title. The winner need not have earned a blue ribbon. This award is a rosette of pink ribbons.

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<u>The Ruth Anderson Award</u>: This award will be presented to a design in the Design Division exhibiting the best use of color. This award is a rosette of fuchsia ribbons.

The Blakely Szosz Award of Sustainability: This award is given for the best use of sustainable components in a design. Environmentally friendly mechanics, upcycling, and/or fully compostable materials will be judged in equal proportion to the overall design. A statement of intent by the designer is required of any exhibitor interested in competing for this award. May be given to a non-blue-ribbon winner. This award is a rosette of medium green and lime green ribbons.

The Novice Award: This award will be presented to a novice exhibiting in any Class in the Design Division who has not won a Blue Ribbon in a Major Flower Show. This award is a lavender ribbon.

Rhode Island Builders Association Awards

<u>The Rhode Island Builders Association Award</u>: This award is selected by members of the RI Builders Association. This award is a rosette of navy-blue ribbons.

Peoples' Choice Award: This award is given to the exhibit that earns the most votes from those attending the show. The award is chosen by ballot. The winner receives a rosette of yellow ribbons.

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5. Design entries will be received between **3-5pm Tues April 2** (those <u>traveling long distance</u>, <u>MUST contact Judy Gray, judy.gray123@gmail.com</u>) and 7AM-9AM on Wednesday April 3, 2024.

6. No cut fruit/vegetables or food items to be used in any design. If wine bottles are used, they must be empty or unopened.

7. A plant list must be entered into RIFGC Link, <u>http://rifgc.pythonanywhere.com/</u> before March 16th. Plant material used must be identified on Entry Form (located on Pedestal) with botanical and common names prior to being passed. You will be able to edit your originally submitted plant list on the day of entry.

DIVISION I DESIGN

Eligible for the Award of Design Excellence

'The Ocean State'

Section A 'Going Coastal'

The smallest state in the U.S. at just 37 miles wide boasts a coastline measuring nearly 400 miles giving Rhode Island the nickname of the "Ocean State". Here you are welcomed with

pristine beaches, watersports, hiking, and thriving aquaculture and fishing industries which of course means incredible seafood.

There are miles upon miles of beautiful sandy beaches to suit every taste from epic surf spots and wild sandy strands to some of the best family beaches on the East Coast. Inlets, headlands, and islands of Narragansett Bay make for both gorgeous scenery and rich ecological diversity.

The southeastern part of Rhode Island is made up of various islands and it would indeed be difficult to access much of what we have to offer without crossing at least one of our 782 bridges- the longest of which is the Claiborne Pell Newport Bridge, a suspension bridge which measures 11,248 feet or 2.1 miles in total length and has towers that reach up 400'.

21 working lighthouses have been keeping ships and shore safe for centuries. Some are elegant and pristine while others are weathered workhorses. These are iconic attractions well worth a visit- you can even play lighthouse keeper overnight at Newport's Rose Island

Lighthouse. Another great way to take in the Ocean State's lighthouses and learn about their great storied histories is from the water on a lighthouse tour.

A Traditional Line or Line Mass Design using all fresh plant material staged on a dark gray pedestal 42" high with a 24" square top in front of a black background.

Class 2 'Bridges'

A Parallel Design using all fresh plant material staged on a dark gray pedestal 42" high with a 24" square top in front of a black background.

Class 3 'Lighthouses'

An Illuminary Design using all fresh plant material staged on a gray pedestal 42" high with a 24" square top in front of a black background.

Section B 'Rhode Trip'

A thriving local art scene, charming villages, and flaming rivers- beauty and adventure await with Rhode Island's farms, local brews, winding trails, and walkable cities. Internationally famous for our Newport Mansions, 'America's First Resort' is also the Sailing Capital of the World. For some the allure of woodland hikes, old stone walls, and open coastal farmland feeds the soul. For others it's the grandeur and majesty of gilded mansions and the rich history here. Whatever your taste, big things come in small packages and quirky, charming Rhode Island is the perfect example.

All designs in this Section are staged in a white niche 12" square and 52" from the floor. Background and underlay are Exhibitor's choice.

Class 4 'Hope'

A Petite Design not to exceed 5" in any direction. The white front panel has a 6 1/2" round opening which begins 1/2" from the base of the niche.

Class 5 'Harmony'

A Monochromatic Petite Design not to exceed 7" in any direction. The white front panel has a 9 1/2" round opening which begins 1/2" from the base of the niche.

Class 6 'Prudence'

A Creative Petite Design to be hung from the top of a niche, not to exceed 8" in any direction. The white front panel has a 9 1/2" round opening which begins 1/2" from the base of the niche.

Section C 'What Cheer Netop'

It's all about hospitality and we extend our own warm welcome to you. *Greetings Friend!* is the loose translation of *'What Cheer Netop'* and combines English with the indigenous Narragansett language. Netop means friend and was the welcome extended to Providence founder Roger Williams by a group of Narragansett on a large rock, now called Slate Rock, along the western shore of the Seekonk River.

Rhode Island's culinary scene is second to none with farms and fresh seafood all within easy reach. It's also easy to get here- and we like a good party- is it any wonder that Rhode Island is one of the top wedding destinations in the United States? There's no reason to stop at our delicious food as we're also home to inventive and award-winning breweries, distilleries, and wineries- *Cheers!*

<u>Eligible for Table Artistry Award</u> Consultant Decorative Units are to be appropriate in size to provided space.

Class 8 'Clambake'

A Buffet Table for Six (6) including a decorative unit. Staged on a 6'x3' long table with black underlay, in front of a black background. Topper is optional.

Class 9 'The Bridal Table'

An Elegant Semi-Formal Dinner Table for Two including a decorative unit. Staged on a $34\frac{1}{4}$ " square table $29\frac{1}{2}$ " high, to be viewed from all sides. A white underlay will be provided by committee and topper provided by Exhibitor.

Section D 'Industrial Revolution'

Rhode Island- specifically Slater Mill in Pawtucket and the Blackstone River Valleyholds the distinction of being the birthplace of the American Industrial Revolution. This was the foundation of our nation's economic freedom in making the transition from an agricultural to an industrialized way of life. Providence became a bustling manufacturing town and by the late 19th century, the city was the transportation hub of southeastern New England due to the extensive railroad network.

Historically notable local industry includes the first successful water powered cottonspinning factory in the United States, Browne and Sharpe precision machine tool builders, Gorham Manufacturing Silversmiths, and Rhode Island was also known as the Jewelry Capital of the World.

Plant material used must be identified on Entry Form (located on Pedestal) with botanical and common names prior to being passed. DIVISION II BOTANICAL ARTS DESIGN

Section A 'A Livelie Experiment'

After striking a land deal with the indigenous Narragansetts in1636, Roger Williams and a small group of followers all seeking personal liberty and religious freedom settled Providence. The Royal Charter of 1663, granted by King Charles II, declared the entire colony of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations a "livelie experiment" where no person could be punished for what he or she believed. Settlers enjoyed freedoms and rights unknown in other colonies, making Rhode Island the most democratic and free community in the English colonies and possibly the world.

Rhode Island was founded upon dissent. Cutting-edge design is pioneered by originality. Here we hope to showcase dissent through design by encouraging exploration and pushing one's boundaries.

<u>Eligible for the Botanical Arts Design Award</u> Consultants:

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Class 13 'The Gilded Age'

A Pot-et-fleur staged on a black pedestal 40" high with a 16 $\frac{3}{4}$ " W x 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ " D top, and black staging panel 32" H x 16 $\frac{3}{4}$ "W.

Class 14 'America's Cup'

A Creative Hanging Design staged suspended from a black shepherd's hook 6' from the floor in front of a black background. The distance between the hook and upright post is 9", and 57" from the point of attachment to the top of black base. Black base is $17" \times 17" W \times 12"$ H.

Class 15 'WaterFire'

A Collage staged on a 4'x8' black panel with a hook attached for hanging 6' from the ground. The minimum dimension for design is 30"x 30", not to exceed the size of the panel.

DIVISION III YOUTH

Division IV Educational

'DISCOVER'

Outreach and education are the core principles of what Garden Clubs represent. Come discover some of the ways you can make an impact in your community!

Eligible for the Educational Top Exhibitor Award Consultant:

Exhibit 1 'Soil Science'

Showcasing frequently used 'Soil Science' terms and understanding the ph. balance of soil. The makeup of your soil is vital to the success of all plant life.

Exhibit 2 ' Regenerative Agriculture'

Barrington Farm School is a non-profit teaching farm that practices regenerative agriculture. We are a volunteer organization that focuses on environmental education, fosters connection to the land, and donates produce to local food pantries.

Exhibit 3 'Discover the Black Swallowtail Butterfly's Journey'

From tiny egg to majestic, winged wonder, and unlock the keys to becoming the ultimate butterfly whisperer in your garden! This exhibition guarantees to transport you through a visual journey showcasing the various stages of the Black Swallowtail butterfly's life.

GLOSSARY

<u>Abstract Design</u> – A design in which there is a dominance of components chosen for their nonnaturalistic character and/or components organized in a non-realistic, non-naturalistic manner.

<u>Assemblage Design</u> – A three-dimensional abstract design, consisting of "found" unrelated objects and plant material. Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017, pp. 77-78.

<u>Botanical Arts</u> - A division in any NGC Flower Show or Specialty Show with the potential for additional types of horticulture, design, and other art-like exhibits (such as photography) not included in the regular Horticulture and Design Divisions, allowing additional opportunities for exhibiting and creativity.

<u>Collage</u> – An abstract design created on a background panel/s with a dominance of components attached in a non-realistic arrangement. Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017 p. 93.

<u>Creative Design</u> - A Creative Floral Design is an acknowledged art form introduced in the late 1950s to American Flower Shows. These designs are not bound by traditional patterns or styles. They are designs with a relationship between form and space. Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017, pp. 71-72.

<u>Design</u> - A "design" is a plan bringing order to an art form by using the elements and principles of design to create beauty, harmony, distinction, and expression. (All references to art forms will be to floral art, floral design, or floral arranging.) Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017.

<u>Hanging Design</u> - A Creative Design suspended and freely moving, including mobiles. Schedule defines space and other requirements. Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017 p. 93

<u>Illuminary Design</u> – A Creative Design incorporating light(s) for special effects and as an integral part of the design. Characteristics can be found in the Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017, on p. 74.

<u>Monochromatic</u> – one (1) color (hue) and all its related tints, tones, and shades, excluding pure achromatic colors(white, gray, black). Handbook of Flower Shows 2017 Revised p.64.

<u>Multi-Rhythmic Design</u> – A Creative Design with emphasis on two (2) or more rhythms in the design with (1) rhythm dominating. Handbook of Flower Shows 2017 Revised p.75.

<u>Panel Design</u> – A Creative Design using a structural panel/s as an integral part of the design. Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017 p.75.

<u>Parallel Design</u> – A Creative Design consisting of three (3) or more groupings of plant material and optional components with a strong parallel placement in a single container and/or base. Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017 p 75.

<u>Petite Design</u> – A design ranging from 3" to 12". Schedule to determine height, width, and depth as well as any additional staging provided. Additional staging provided by exhibitor is considered as part of the height requirement. Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017 p 73.

<u>Pot-et-fleur</u> - A design with an emphasis on a combination of two (2) or more flowering and/or foliage plants with roots growing in soil or other medium. Fresh cut flower/s must be included. Characteristics can be found in Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017 p 94.

<u>Table Design</u> – A Functional Table for two (2) or more persons, determined by the schedule. Must include decorative unit. Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017 p 76-77.

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<u>Traditional Design</u> – See Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017 p 69-71.

<u>Transparency Design</u> – A Creative Design with see-through elements (translucent, diaphanous, grid-like materials, etc.) integral to the design and permitting some components to be viewed through others. Handbook of Flower Shows Revised 2017 p 77.


