GENERAL RULES

- 1. This is a National Garden Clubs (NGC) Design Specialty Flower Show and conforms to the standards established by NGC according to the Handbook for Flower Shows 2017 edition. https://gardenclub.org/sites/default/files/2022-01/ngc-handbook-for-flower-shows-january-2022-revision.pdf
- 2. All classes are open to all NGC members.
- 3. **Design Entries** will be accepted **on Wednesday April 9, 7AM-9AM.** All exhibitors are limited to two hours to place their design(s). Designs may be executed off-site and brought to the show completed.
- 4. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per class but may enter more than one class.
- 5. If a designer is unable to fulfill her/his assignment, it is her/his responsibility to find a replacement and notify the Design Entries Chair.
- 6. Youth Entries will be accepted on Tuesday, April 8, 9AM-2:30 PM.
- 7. Educational Entries will be accepted on Tuesday, April 8, Noon-5:00PM.
- 8. Judging will take place on Wednesday April 9, 2024, 10:00AM
- 9. Exhibits must be removed on Sunday, April 13 **after the show closes**, between **5:00 pm and 6:00 pm. No early removal.** If you are unable to pick up, make arrangements with someone for pickup.
- 10. The Classification Chair for each division checks the exhibits for conformity to the schedule prior to the judging. Final determination for conformance is the judges' responsibility.
- 11. The Shows Co-Chairs and the Classification Chair are available during the judging for possible consultation. They, along with the Judges and Clerks are the only personnel allowed on the floor during the judging.
- 12. The decisions of the judges are final. Awards may be withheld if not merited.
- 13. There must be an emphasis on *fresh* plant material. No artificial plant material is permitted in any division.
- 14. Refer to HB P80 for items permitted without schedule approval.
- 15. The RIFGC and the RI Builder's Association will strive to assure the safety of all items after arrival and placement but are not responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits.
- 16. Conservation/Endangered list may not be used unless grown by the exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner and so stated. Invasive plants may never be used.
- 17. Entering a design gives the flower show permission to use the design in photos, promotions, etc.
- 18. The Scales of Points for Designs is listed in the Handbook for Flower Shows, 2017 edition, Chapter 14.

AWARDS

THE STANDARD SYSTEM OF AWARDING IS USED

Only one first place (blue) ribbon per class.

Must score 90 points or more.

Only one second place (red) ribbon per class.

Must score 85 points or more.

Only one third place (yellow) ribbon per class.

Must score 80 points or more.

One or more honorable mention (white) ribbons per class.

Must score 75 points or more.

Judges are asked to consider non-blue-ribbon winners for a 90+ recognition.

NGC TOP EXHIBITOR AWARDS

All Top Exhibitor Awards must be blue-ribbon winners scoring 95 or above

Design Division

Award of Design Excellence- A Division Award: Only one award may be offered to the highest scoring blue-ribbon exhibit in the entire Design Division. This award is a rosette of gold ribbons.

Section Awards

Must have a minimum of three classes with four entries in each section.

<u>Designer's Choice Award:</u> Exhibitor has the freedom to select components, within the NGC policies. Section B is eligible for this award, a rosette of purple ribbons.

<u>Petite Award:</u> May be offered to the most outstanding Petite Design. Section C is eligible for this award, a small rosette of blue and white ribbons.

Table Artistry Award: This award is available for Functional and Exhibition tables. Section D is eligible for this award, a rosette of burgundy ribbons.

Tricolor Award: This award requires that all plant material used in the designs must be **fresh**. Section A is eligible for this award, a rosette of red yellow and blue ribbons.

Education Division

Educational Top Exhibitor Award: Must have a minimum of two (2) exhibits. Must use a minimum of 18 square feet of surface space. This award is a rosette of brown and white ribbons.

Youth Division

Youth Top Exhibitor Awards - Artistic Crafts & Design: An Award may be given to the best exhibit in each of the three age groups. Junior: Pre-school – 7 yrs, Intermediate: 8yrs – 12yrs, and High School: 13yrs – 18yrs. The exhibit must score 90 or more points. These awards are a rosette of red, white, and blue ribbons.

ADDITIONAL AWARDS

Rhode Island Federation of Garden Clubs, Inc. Awards:

Rhode Island Federation of Garden Clubs' President's Award: This award winner is selected by the President of RIFGC from among the blue-ribbon winners in the Division I Design. This award is a rosette of green and white ribbons.

Flower Show Judges' Award: This award may be given to the exhibit in the Design Division that best depicts its class title. The winner need not have earned a blue ribbon. This award is a rosette of pink ribbons.

The Ruth Anderson Award: This award will be presented to a design in the Design Division exhibiting the best use of color. This award is a rosette of fuchsia ribbons.

The Blakely Szosz Award of Sustainability: This award is given for the best use of sustainable components in a design. Environmentally friendly mechanics, upcycling, and/or fully compostable materials will be judged in equal proportion to the strength of the overall design. A statement of intent by the designer is required for any exhibitor interested in competing for this award. May be given to a non-blue-ribbon winner. This award is a rosette of medium green and lime green ribbons.

The Novice Award: This award will be presented to a novice exhibiting in any Class in the Design Division who has not won a Blue Ribbon in a Major Flower Show. This award is a layender ribbon.

Rhode Island Builders Association Awards

The Rhode Island Builders Association Award: This award is selected by members of the RI Builders Association. This award is a rosette of navy-blue ribbons.

Peoples' Choice Award: This award is given to the exhibit that earns the most votes from those attending the show. The award is chosen by ballot. The winner receives a rosette of yellow ribbons.

- 2. Advance registration is required, by going to RIFGC Registration Link, http://rifgc.pythonanywhere.com/ Questions contact Design Entries Chairman Judy Gray 603-707-7785 or judy.gray123@gmail.com.
- 3. The design entered must be the work of one exhibitor only and that name must appear on the entry card. Each exhibitor may enter only one design per class; but may enter more than one class.
- 4. If an exhibitor is unable to fulfill her/his assignment, it is her /his responsibility to provide a substitute and inform the Entries Chairman.
- 5. Design entries will be received between 7AM-9AM on Wednesday April 9, 2025.
- 6. No cut fruit/vegetables or food items to be used in any design. If wine bottles are used, they must be empty or unopened.
- 7. A plant list must be entered into RIFGC Registration Link, http://rifgc.pythonanywhere.com/ before April 1st. Plant material used must be identified on Entry Form (located on Pedestal) with botanical and common names prior to being passed. You will be able to edit your originally submitted plant list on the day of entry.
- 8. Rules for Design, Advance Design, and Table Designs are printed in the Handbook for Flower Shows 2017 edition, Chapter 7 and/or online https://gardenclub.org/sites/default/files/2022-01/ngc-handbook-for-flower-shows-january-2022-revision.pdf
- 9. The exhibitor is required to conform to the stated descriptions and limitations of the Design Type if named in the class.
- 10. The Scales of Points for Designs is listed in the Handbook for Flower Shows, 2017 edition, Chapter 14.
- 11. Statements of Intent are optional unless competing for The Blakely Szosz Award of Sustainability. All statements must be entered into registration link http://rifgc.pythonanywhere.com on or before April1st. Limit the size to no more than 3-4 sentences.

DIVISION I DESIGN

Eligible for the Award of Design Excellence

Dance Hall Days

Section A 'Everybody Come Dancing...'

Dance has long been used as a tool for social communication and bonding among groups of humans with evidence of dance in cave paintings in India that date back to 9000 BCE. Whether it's for religious, social, celebratory, or entertainment purposes dancing with a partner or group inspires and enhances connection.

Eligible for the Tricolor Award Consultant:

Class 1 'Waltz' 4 Entries

A Cascade Design using all fresh plant material staged on a dark gray pedestal 42" high with a 24" square top in front of a black background.

Class 2 'Swing' 4 Entries

A Multi-Rhythmic Design using all fresh plant material staged on a dark gray pedestal 42" high with a 24" square top in front of a black background.

Class 3 'Line Dancing' 4 Entries

A Parallel Design using all fresh plant material staged on a dark gray pedestal 42" high with a 24" square top in front of a black background.

Section B 'Nobody Puts Baby in a Corner'

It's no secret that dancing is a great way to bring a group of people together. There are certain occasions entirely designed around dancing and getting up and participating is almost a given. Not only is it fun but it an easy way for people of all backgrounds to socialize and celebrate life.

Eligible for Table Artistry Award Consultant:

Class 4 'Ballroom'

4 Entries

A Functional Semi-formal table for 4 staged on a 30" tall table 36" round, to be viewed from all sides. Floor length white underlay provided by committee.

Class 5 'Prom' 4 Entries

A Functional table for 2 staged on a 34 1/4" square table 29 1/2" high, to be viewed from all sides. Floor length white underlay provided by committee.

Class 6 'Hoedown' 4 Entries

Exhibition Table staged on a black, sandpaper finish, pedestal, 40" high with a 24" square top. A black frame 36" high x 24" wide x 3" deep, backed with black foam board, is attached to the back of pedestal top. Exhibitor may attach own backboard to front of frame. (working on securing this staging, refer back to email)

Section C 'Dancing With Myself'

Performance by an individual may be for the benefit of themselves, an audience, or for both. Individuals may dance to exercise, have fun, celebrate artistry/self-expression, and for cultural/religious reasons.

Eligible for Designer's Choice

Consultant:

Class 7 'Ballet' 4 Entries

Creative Line or Creative Line-Mass Design using fresh and/or dried plant material staged on a black pedestal 42" high with a 24" round top, in front of a black background.

Class 8 'Breakdancing'

4 Entries

A Low-Profile Design using fresh and/or dried plant material staged on a white table, 18" high x 22" wide x 35 1/2" length.

Class 9 'Pole Dancing'

4 Entries

Floor Design staged in front of a 4'x8' black staging panel. May be viewed from three sides, underlay is optional.

Section D 'Shake, Rattle, and Roll'

Inherent properties of dance translate into physical, psychological, and emotional health benefits for all ages making it a valuable tool for teaching and development.

Eligible for the Petite Award

Consultant:

Class 10 'Spinning'

4 Entries

A Creative Petite Design to be hung from the top of a niche, not to exceed 8" in any direction. Inside dimensions are 12"x12"x12". The white front panel has a 9 1/2" round opening which begins 1/2" from the base of the niche.

Class 11 'Repetition'

4 Entries

A Petite Design not to exceed 7" in any direction. Inside dimensions are 12"x12"x12". The white front panel has a $9\ 1/2"$ round opening which begins 1/2" from the base of the niche.

Class 12 'Balance' 4 Entries

A Petite Design using complimentary colors not to exceed 5" in any direction. Inside dimensions are 12"x12"x12". The white front panel has a $6\ 1/2"$ round opening which begins 1/2" from the base of the niche.

DIVISION II YOUTH

'Saturday Night Fever'

Youth Botanical Arts Rules

- 1. Exhibits must contain some plant material, either fresh and/or dried. Only dried material may be treated.
- 2. No artificial, endangered, or locally invasive plant material may be used.
- 3. Advance registration required for Botanical Arts Division. Entries should be sent to: Eileen Dennis 401-245-6296 edteazels@aol.com
- 4. Schedule may determine type of craft, staging and number of entries.
- 5. See General Rules for entry times.
- 6. Exhibits are judged by Artistic Crafts Scale of Points found on P 131 in the Handbook for Flower Shows, 2017 edition.

DIVISION III - EDUCATION RULES

- 1. A minimum of two exhibits is required for an Education Award to be given.

Eligible for The Education Award Consultant:

Modern Dance

A highly expressive style that challenges traditional structured dance technique, Modern Dance is freeform and improvisational, it's emotional, and it rejects convention. While honoring history but celebrating creativity and adaptation it perfectly represents our Educational Exhibits.

Glossary

Cascade Design – A design with an emphasis on a downward rhythmic movement. 1. The downward lines may be curved, straight, zigzag, interrupted or may be a combination. 2. The design is supported by a container or other device. 3. A minimum of components may extend upward.

Complementary Colors – colors opposite each other on the color wheel.

Creative Line Design – a Creative Design where line is dominant with a minimum of plant material and other optional components. 1. The line may be straight, curved or a combination. 2. There may be one (1) or more points of emergence and focal areas.

Creative Line-Mass Design – a Creative Design similar to Creative Line Design except additional plant material and/or other optional components are included to add strength and depth to the design.

Exhibition Table- A mode of table classes in an NGC Flower Show. An artistic arrangement of decorative unit or plant material and dining components staged with no consideration for functionality. More information see page 76-77 in the Handbook for Flower Shows, 2017 edition.

Functional Table – A mode of table classes in the NGC Flower Show, planned and set for actual service of food.

Low-Profile Design – a three-dimensional design incorporating three (3) or more design techniques.

Multi-Rhythmic Design – a Creative Design with emphasis on two (2) or more rhythms in the design with one (1) rhythm dominating. 1. Lines create two (2) or more separate and distinct rhythms, each creating a different pattern and movement unlike the other. 2. Lines may go in any direction, be continuous, interrupted and/or crossed.

Parallel Design – a design consisting of three (3) or more groupings of plant material and optional components with a strong parallel placement in a single container and/or base.
